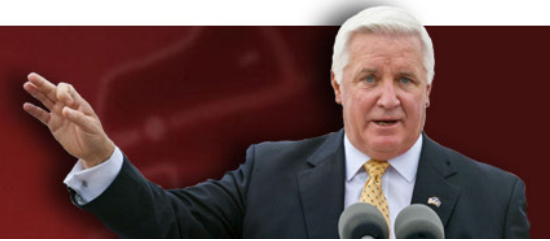


Path to Recovery – 2011



January

Jan. 18

Governor Tom Corbett sworn into office.

Jan. 25

Gov. Corbett Announces his Reform Plan for a More Efficient and Responsible Pennsylvania Government.

Jan. 25

Gov. Corbett signs executive order creating an open government website allowing taxpayers to easily search the state budget for expenditures.

February

Feb. 15

Gov. Corbett announces changes and increased oversight in the Department of Health and Department of State, including new controls and conditions designed to protect the health and safety of women.

March

March 8

Gov. Corbett signs Executive Order 2011-01, establishing the Marcellus Shale Advisory Commission, to address the needs and impacts of natural gas development on local communities, as well as promote the efficient, environmentally sound and cost-effective development of Marcellus Shale and other natural gas resources.

March 8

Gov. Corbett lays out his 27.3 billion dollar budget in an address to the General Assembly that cuts spending and does not raise taxes.

March 30

Beginning the process of reducing the size of the state-owned automotive fleet, Gov. Corbett sent to auction a 1991 tour bus that has cost Pennsylvania taxpayers more than \$66,000 in spite of it being driven less than 26,000 miles in the eight years of the Rendell Administration.

April

April 21

Gov. Corbett signs Executive Order 2011-02 establishing the Governor's Transportation Funding Advisory Commission, a commission to develop a comprehensive, strategic proposal for addressing the transportation funding needs of Pennsylvania.

May

June 22

In keeping with a commitment to public safety, Gov. Corbett signs legislation banning the synthetic drugs known as "Bath Salts"

June 24

Gov. Corbett announces contract with Public Sector Unions that saves taxpayers \$418 million.

June 27

Gov. Corbett signs into law the Castle Doctrine.

June 28

Gov. Corbett signs into law Tort Reform, protecting small business and helping to create jobs.

June 30

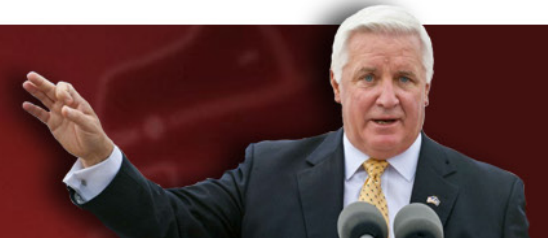
Gov. Corbett signs Property tax reform into law, ensuring that local governments will have to live within their means, and will not raise property taxes on working families without voter approval.

June 30

Governor Tom Corbett signs into law \$27.15 billion dollar budget without raising taxes, the first on time budget in 9 years.

July

August

Aug. 4

Gov. Corbett signs House Bill 463 that ensures thousands of older Pennsylvanians enrolled in the PACE and PACENET program will not lose their coverage as the result of a small increase in their Social Security benefits.

Aug. 10

Gov. Corbett takes three-day kayak tour through Northeastern Pennsylvania to promote the state's vast recreational activities.

Sept. 21

Gov. Corbett releases \$15 million in state funding to continue the Delaware River Main Channel-Deepening project to keep the port of Philadelphia economically competitive.

Sept. 29

Gov. Corbett creates a new Governor's Advisory Council on Privatization and Innovation to explore if any functions now performed by state government might be better and more cost-effectively performed by the private sector.

Oct. 3

Gov. Corbett puts forth his safe, jobs friendly plan for Marcellus Shale natural gas development.

Oct. 11

Gov. Corbett puts forth his education reform proposal that puts students first.

Oct. 25

Gov. Corbett signs House Bill 9, also known as "Lacey's Law," which helps protect teen drivers.

Nov. 9

Gov. Corbett signs legislation that bans texting while driving on PA roads.

Nov. 14

Gov. Corbett signs the "Safety in Youth Sports Act," a bill intended to prevent serious head injuries in student athletes and strengthen education about the risks of concussions.

Dec. 14

Gov. Corbett announces \$31.5 million investment in recreation, conservation, community revitalization projects statewide.

Dec. 20

Gov. Corbett signed into law the "Adam Walsh Bill," also known as Senate Bill 1183, which will strengthen the state's rule on convicted sex offenders, by imposing tougher reporting standards.
