I am pleased to present the Annual Report for State Fiscal Year 2005-2006 of the Tobacco Use Prevention and Cessation Program, Chapter 7 of Act 77 of 2001, the Tobacco Settlement Act.

Act 2005 - 1A subsequently altered the funding stream for Pennsylvania's Tobacco Use Prevention and Cessation Program created by Act 77 of 2001. This is the first Annual Report since this change in funding.

The program goals support the following Healthy People 2010 objectives established for the nation's health:

- 1. Change community norms through state-advised, community-driven systems that create environments where it is uncommon to see, use, and be negatively impacted by tobacco products and tobacco smoke pollution.
- 2. Reduce consumption of tobacco products in Pennsylvania youth and adults to less than 12% by 2010.

We are very proud of the accomplishments made by the Department and our community partners. These programs and initiatives are continuing to move Pennsylvania into the forefront of states successfully reducing the burden of chronic disease, closing the gap on disparate populations, and improving the health of all Pennsylvanians through the continued promotion of healthy lifestyles free from tobacco.

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PREFACE

Tobacco use is the leading preventable cause of death in the U.S. killing more than 440,000 Americans every year and causing more than \$155 billion in health care costs and lost productivity.¹

- Smoking kills more people than alcohol, AIDS, car crashes, illegal drugs, murders, and suicides combined; and
- Tobacco use kills 20,000 Pennsylvania adults every year.

For every dollar invested in prevention, we can save three dollars in healthcare costs

- Pennsylvania's annual healthcare costs directly caused by smoking are \$4.78 billion;
- Costs covered by the state Medicaid program are \$1.5 billion annually; and
- Smoking-caused productivity losses in Pennsylvania are \$4.42 billion annually.

The peak years for first trying to smoke appear to be in the sixth and seventh grades, or between the ages of 11 and 12.²

- Within weeks or just days of first starting to smoke occasionally, young smokers show signs of addiction, such as feeling anxious or irritable and having strong urges to smoke;
- Addiction rates for experimenters who become habitual users for smoking are higher than addiction rates for marijuana, alcohol, or even cocaine;
- More than a third of all youth who ever try smoking a cigarette will become regular daily smokers before they leave high school; and
- More than 80% of all adult smokers first become regular smokers before the age of 18, and more than 90% do so before leaving their teens.

Published research studies have found that youth are three times more sensitive to tobacco advertising than adults and are more likely to be influenced to smoke by cigarette marketing than by peer pressure, and that one third of underage experimentation with smoking is attributable to tobacco company advertising.³

- Annual tobacco industry marketing expenditures nationwide are \$15.4 billion
- Estimated portion spent for Pennsylvania marketing each year is \$706 million

Numerous research studies have found that smoking and exposure to secondhand smoke among pregnant women is a major cause of spontaneous abortions, stillbirths, and sudden infant death syndrome.⁴

- Smoking during pregnancy creates a more serious risk of spontaneous abortion and a greater threat to the survival and health of newborns and children than using cocaine during pregnancy.
- Nationally one out of every eight pregnant women smoke. In Pennsylvania one out of every six pregnant women smoke.

On June 26, 2001, Act 77 of 2001, was signed into law. Chapter 7 of the Tobacco Settlement Act outlined the requirements for prevention and cessation activities. The Act established a tobacco use prevention and cessation program within the Department of Health. Seventy percent (70%) of the appropriated funds must be provided to primary contractors to establish community-based comprehensive tobacco control programs. The remaining funds (30%) are to be used for statewide efforts consistent with the priorities of the Act.

Tobacco use prevention and cessation components are outlined as follows: 1) statewide, community, and school programs designed to reduce tobacco use; 2) chronic disease programs to reduce the burden of tobacco-related diseases, including prevention and early detection; 3) enforcement of applicable laws related to tobacco access; 4) efforts designed to counter tobacco influences and increase health-related messages; 5) tobacco cessation programs, with a priority for serving the uninsured and low-income populations; 6) monitoring program accountability by requiring the evaluation and documentation of, or conducting research regarding the effectiveness of the program and program results; and 7) administration and management to facilitate the coordination of state and local programs.

National Healthy People 2010 objectives established for the nation's health include:

- 1. Reduce consumption of tobacco products in Pennsylvania youth and adults to less than 12% by the year 2010.
- 2. Change community norms through state-advised, community-driven systems that create environments where it is uncommon to see, use, or be negatively impacted by tobacco products and tobacco smoke pollution.

The Department's four programmatic goals that support achieving the Healthy People 2010 objectives are:

- Prevent the initiation of tobacco use among young people;
- Promote quitting among adults and young people;
- Eliminate nonsmokers' exposure to secondhand smoke; and
- Identify and eliminate tobacco-related disparities.

Funding information for the Tobacco Prevention and Control Program, additional grants received, Statewide Contractors, Primary Contractors, and Service Providers is provided in **Appendices A-1 through A-5.**

State Fiscal Year 2005-2006 marks the fourth full year of Pennsylvania's comprehensive tobacco control program funded through the Tobacco Master Settlement dollars. The collaborative program efforts at the state, regional, and local levels continue to actively effect youth and adult tobacco use.

PENNSYLVANIA ACCOMPLISHMENTS IN TOBACCO PREVENTION AND CONTROL

√ The Pennsylvania Youth Survey 2005 conducted by the Pennsylvania Commission on Crime and Delinquency showed both 30-day and lifetime use of cigarettes are at an all-time low for youth in grades 6, 8, and 10.

- √ The percentage of adult smokers in Pennsylvania who attempted to quit smoking (one day or longer in the past year) increased significantly between 2000 and 2003, from 43% to 53%.⁵
 - In 2005 the prevalence of current smokers who are trying to quit is **56%** (CI 53% to 59%).
 - o 18-29: **60%** (CI 53% to 67%)
 - o 30-44: **56%** (CI 51% to 61%)
 - o 45-64: **53%** (CI 49% to 57%)
 - o 65+: **52%** (CI 44% to 59%)
 - National data has shown that an average of seven "quit attempts" is necessary before a smoker stays completely tobacco free.
- √ Pennsylvania's annual Synar Survey 2005 reported an **8.1%** rate for illegal sales of tobacco products to minors. This was down from 10.8% in 2003 and 27.9% in 2001.⁶
 - All states are required to conduct the annual Synar Survey to calculate the illegal sales rate of tobacco products to minors.
 - The Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration's (SAMHSA) required goal since 2002 is 20% or less.
 - States that do not meet their youth access goals face the loss of 40% of their substance abuse prevention and treatment (SAPT) block grant for the following year; Pennsylvania's 40% loss would be approximately \$24 million.

- √ The Pennsylvania Free Quitline (1-800-QUIT-NOW) 12 month cessation rate is 23%
 - 2,805 Pennsylvanians received three one-on-one counseling sessions (8,415 total sessions)
 - 1,874 Pennsylvanians received five one-on-one counseling sessions (9,370 total sessions)
 - Between July 1, 2005 and June 30, 2006 the Quitline processed 9,172 intake calls
 - The Pennsylvania Free Quitline is offered as a partnership between the Pennsylvania Department of Health and the American Cancer Society, and is available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.

MEASURING OUR PROGRESS

The Department recognizes that reducing the rate of youth and adult tobacco use is a complex social issue that requires a multi-faceted approach. In order to measure the progress of state and local initiatives, the Department has created an extensive evaluation component to measure both short-term and long-term outcomes.

Surveillance and Monitoring Systems

Pennsylvania Behavioral Risk Factor Surveillance System (BRFSS)

The Pennsylvania BRFSS is developed through the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, and is used by all states to measure progress in achieving national health objectives. The largest, continuously conducted telephone health survey in the world, BRFSS collects data from adults on health behaviors related to leading causes of death.

2005 BRFSS data report on adult tobacco use is provided as **Appendix B.**

Adult Tobacco Survey (ATS):

The ATS baseline statewide survey was conducted in 2005 through the Health Science Education Center at Clarion University and complements the BRFSS, providing detailed information on the full range of tobacco control topics, such as program effectiveness, public knowledge, attitudes, and behavior with respect to tobacco use.

2005 ATS data on Indicators for Promoting Quitting and Indicators for Eliminating Secondhand Smoke is provided as **Appendix C.**

Pennsylvania Youth Tobacco Survey (YTS):

The YTS was developed to provide states with the data necessary to support the design, implementation, and evaluation of a comprehensive tobacco control program. The YTS is designed to evaluate prevalence of tobacco use, knowledge and attitudes, media and advertising receptivity, access to tobacco products, curriculum, tobacco smoke pollution, and attitudes toward cessation and readiness to quit. Pennsylvania conducted the YTS for the first time in 2000 to establish baseline measures for developing a comprehensive tobacco control program. The second YTS was conducted in 2002. The third YTS will be conducted in 2006.

Summary information on the Youth Tobacco Survey, the Pennsylvania Youth Survey conducted by the Pennsylvania Commission on Crime and Delinquency, and the National Youth Tobacco Survey conducted through the American Legacy Foundation is provided as **Appendix D.**

Tobacco Prevention Reporting System (TPRS)

The TPRS is a comprehensive, centralized web-based tobacco reporting and management information system created in January 2002. The system measures short-term, intermediate-

term, and long-term outcomes of tobacco use. In addition, the system includes a tobacco minimum data set; a tobacco prevention knowledge database; and fully defined and functional fiscal, planning, evaluation, service tracking, utilities, and report modules.

Synar Survey

Federal regulations since 1996 have required all states to conduct an annual survey of tobacco retailers to determine the illegal sale rate of tobacco to youth under the age of 18 years. Since 2002, all states are required to maintain an illegal sale rate of 20% or less. Pennsylvania's Synar Survey is conducted through the Division of Tobacco Prevention and Control in collaboration with the Bureau of Health Statistics and Research, the six Tobacco Prevention Consultants from the Community Health Districts, Primary Contractors and their community partners.

Summary information on Pennsylvania's Synar Surveys is provided as Appendix E.

Program Evaluation

Since September 2005, Philadelphia Health Management Corporation (PHMC) and its partner, Branch Associates, Inc., (BAI) have been conducting an evaluation of the process and impacts of the Pennsylvania Tobacco Use Prevention and Cessation Program. The evaluation team from PHMC and BAI has been working with staff from the Pennsylvania Department of Health, primary and statewide contractors and other tobacco control program stakeholders to identify program strengths and challenges from the first four years of the program in Pennsylvania to inform a standardized approach to assess the progress and impact of the program going forward.

The evaluation has two major components. The first is a retrospective study from SFY 2001-2002 through SFY 2005-2006 and includes a review of documents from all funded programs as well as web-based surveys and key informant interviews with local and statewide contractors. The second component is a prospective evaluation of program activities beginning with 2005 contracts. The evaluation team will develop a methodology to collect standard process data (the volume indicators that track program activity such as number of Pennsylvanians served and number of training sessions or presentations provided, and retention rates) and outcome data (measurement of the intended short, intermediate, and long-term impact for individuals and populations during and after program activities such as changes in attitudes, knowledge, and beliefs to decreased tobacco use, reduced exposure to secondhand smoke, and reduced tobacco-related morbidity and mortality among all Pennsylvanians) from all contractors to monitor program effectiveness, highlight program successes, and identify opportunities for change.

STRATEGIC PLANNING

Addressing Pennsylvania's Tobacco-Related Health Disparities – Developing a Statewide Strategic Plan

The Pennsylvania Department of Health is committed to eliminating health disparities among all segments of the population and in 2004 began a major initiative to address tobacco-related health disparities. According to national best practices, eliminating disparities requires a health promotion approach that emphasizes strengthening capacity and infrastructure in communities, involving multiple public agencies, promoting political action and policies that improve health, and building supportive environments. To be successful, significant resources must be applied comprehensively rather than with an incremental, piecemeal approach.

One of the outcomes of the Department's disparities initiative is the development of the *Pennsylvania Strategic Plan to Eliminate Tobacco-Related Health Disparities*. Through a broad, diverse community-wide process, six population subgroups were identified by the Department's Disparities Workgroup: African Americans; Hispanics; Asian Americans; Native Americans; rural residents, including Amish; and LGBTQ (Lesbian, Gay, Bi-Sexual, Transgender, and Questioning). Such population subgroups are themselves very complex, and Pennsylvania joins other states in the need for additional research and data collecting to refine and narrow specific target populations.

The Disparities Workgroup, in collaboration with the Center for Minority Health (CMH) at the University of Pittsburgh and the Pennsylvania Department of Health (PA DOH), is developing a Strategic Plan which charts the course to address health disparities related to tobacco use in a comprehensive, statewide fashion. The plan focuses on community competence and capacity in tobacco use prevention and control at community, local, and state levels. The Plan maps funding, policy, research, capacity building and the establishment of population-specific interventions as the framework for achieving the elimination of tobacco-related disparities in Pennsylvania.

The Development of a Statewide Strategic Tobacco Prevention and Control Plan

Temple University was named to assist the Department in the development of statewide strategic tobacco prevention and control plan by June 30, 2007. Since starting in October 2005, a 30-member statewide Steering Committee was created to assist and guide the development process. Through the Steering Committee members, a diverse group of stakeholder organizations and individuals was identified.

The Steering Committee utilized the CDC four goals to create the structure for the facilitated discussions of the work groups at each stakeholder meeting:

- Prevent the initiation of tobacco use among young people;
- Promote tobacco cessation among adults and young people;
- Eliminate exposure to secondhand smoke; and
- Identify and eliminate tobacco-related disparities

Stakeholder meetings were held in Pittsburgh, Philadelphia, and Harrisburg, and focused on obtaining key information on the current and future needs of the Pennsylvania tobacco prevention and control program; establishing goals and objectives for a four-year strategic plan; identifying specific strategies for each objective; determining target audiences for activities identified in the plan and establishing outcome measures. The actual writing of the plan has begun and an initial draft has been completed and will be available in the next quarter.

STATEWIDE INITIATIVES

PENNSYLVANIA'S FREE QUITLINE 1-800-QUIT NOW

On June 26, 2002, the Department launched Pennsylvania's first Free Quitline. Pennsylvania's Free Quitline is available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. English and Spanish speaking counselors are available at all times with other languages available as needed. Pennsylvania's Free Quitline is offered as a partnership between the Pennsylvania Department of Health and the national American Cancer Society.

Tobacco users receive counseling from highly trained intake specialists and cessation counselors. After the initial call to the Quitline, callers who are ready to quit determine a quit date and are offered up to five free one-on-one calls to assist them through the quitting process. The sessions are tailored to the individual needs of the caller and focus on specific strategies and actions for that caller. If a caller is not ready to quit, they are provided with self-help materials and tailored fact sheets.

Pennsylvania established its Quitline using 1-877-724-1090. In June 2005, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention launched a national Quitline number, 1-800-QUIT-NOW that states could use as a routing number to existing Quitline services. By utilizing this service, Pennsylvania has benefited from the national branding efforts. The national promotional campaigns have increased access to Quitline services without the use of additional state dollars.

- The 12 month Quitline cessation rate is 23%;
- A total of 9,168 intake calls were completed in 2005-2006;
- 16.6% of callers to the PA Free Quitline were African American;
- 7.2% of callers were Hispanic/Latino;
- 2,805 Pennsylvanians received three one-on-one counseling sessions (8,415 total sessions); and
- 1,874 Pennsylvanians received five one-on-one counseling sessions (9,370 total sessions)

CAPACITY BUILDING FOR ETHNIC AND RACIAL MINORITY POPULATIONS

The Center for Minority Health (CMH), at the Graduate School of Public Health (GSPH), University of Pittsburgh, provided statewide technical assistance around the issues of tobacco in the ethnic, racial and disparate populations to primary contractors and service providers.

During this final year of its contract CMH provided the following services:

- Added a tobacco prevention and cessation component to its eight-session and one-day POWER Lay Health Advocate (LHA) certificate training programs. The LHA Program equips "natural helpers" (i.e., barbers, hair stylist, public housing tenant council members, faith-based community workers, and day care professionals) to provide intervention programs such as smoking cessation.
- Provided academic leadership for the development of a strategic plan to eliminate tobacco-related health disparities in Pennsylvania including a health profile and data report on six distinct disparately-affected populations on Pennsylvania.
- Conducted "Closing the Health Disparities Gap: What have we done? What have we learned? and What should we do next?" a statewide tobacco prevention and control symposium. The two-day symposium was attended by over 130 individuals who represented diverse expertise and interest as tobacco disparities researchers, practitioners, advocates and program managers.
- Assessed the training and technical assistance needs of State Health Improvement Partnerships (SHIP) in the Southwest Pennsylvania District which included a trainthe-trainer session for the Winning Path: Love Thy Neighbor Program a faith-based tobacco cessation curriculum.

STATEWIDE YOUTH AND YOUNG ADULT INITIATIVES

The Health Science Education Center (HSEC/The Center) at Clarion University opened in May of 2002 with a primary goal of providing health education programs for school-aged children living within a 40-mile radius of Clarion. The Center's health education programs for students grades K-12 complements the current health and science curriculums of local school districts and assists in meeting the national and state health education standards. Although the primary focus of the HSEC remains the delivery of health promotion programs for students K-12, the PA DOH has expanded programming at The Center to include three statewide anti-tobacco initiatives (Project X – grades 4 through 7; BUSTED! – grades 8 through 12; and PA-SWAT – young adults 18-24).

YouthQuest 2006

Youth Quest 2006, held in Harrisburg April 25-26, 2006, was the culmination of a year-long project to increase awareness of the harmful effects of tobacco use and exposure to secondhand smoke. Over 1,200 BUSTED! and PA-SWAT members along with their adult leaders assembled on the Capitol steps with 23,000 pairs of shoes commemorating the 20,000 lives lost each year in Pennsylvania as a result of tobacco use. Youth also visited their local legislators to share information about the harmful effects of tobacco.

Project X

Project X is Pennsylvania's anti-tobacco program for students in grades 4-7. Project X is implemented as a school-based assembly, and used as an introduction to a comprehensive school-based curriculum. The purpose of this program is to provide instruction on the short and

long-term consequences of tobacco use, social influences on tobacco use, peer norms regarding tobacco use, school policy on tobacco use, cessation efforts, and refusal skills. Project X is designed in conjunction with the recommended guidelines of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention for school programs on the following areas:

- develop and enforce school policy;
- provide instruction against tobacco use;
- tobacco use prevention education;
- support cessation efforts among student and staff;
- provide program specific training for teachers; and,
- involve parents or families in supporting school-based programs.

A total of 74 programs were conducted in 60 schools providing age-appropriate messaging on the harmful effects of tobacco use and tobacco use prevention information to 11,554 children.

BUSTED! is Pennsylvania's youth-led program for students aged 14 to 17 years, designed to involve youth to counter the tobacco industry's manipulation vis-à-vis tobacco use initiation.

There were 1,304 new BUSTED! memberships through the online registration process increasing the number of youth across the state associated with the BUSTED! campaign to over 4,000.

Pennsylvania Students Working Against Tobacco (PA-SWAT)

PA-SWAT is Pennsylvania's anti-tobacco campaign for college-aged students. Each chapter has an adult facilitator, a campus task force, and a student Executive Board Member guiding the activities of the campus campaign. Each chapter conducts a campus assessment and develops a strategy to address tobacco use.

Campus highlights during the year for the PA-SWAT program were:

- Millersville University received national recognition for its innovative tobacco prevention and cessation program;
- Lock Haven University eliminated the sale of tobacco products from their book store;
- Clarion University implemented its smoke-free policy in residence halls; and
- University of Pittsburgh Bradford Campus expanded the campus smoke-free area, moving smokers away from building doorways.

Nineteen new PA-SWAT chapters were established on higher education campuses in Pennsylvania bringing the total number of college and university campuses with PA-SWAT Chapters to 32, reaching 190,000 college students.

TOBACCO CESSATION CLINICAL PRACTICE GUIDELINES – PARTNERING WITH PENNSYLVANIA'S HEALTHCARE PROVIDERS

The Department of Health provides funding for the Pennsylvania Area Health Education Center (PA AHEC) to institutionalize the consistent identification, documentation, and treatment of every tobacco user seen in a healthcare setting. The PA AHEC has developed education and training programs in tobacco cessation and intervention for practitioners and health professions students in the disciplines of physical and oral health based on the Agency for Healthcare Research and Quality (AHRQ) *Smoking Cessation Clinical Practice Guidelines*.

According to the 2005 Pennsylvania Behavioral Risk Factor Surveillance Survey, 69% (95% CI, 65-72) of patients who smoked were advised by their physician to quit.

During the July 1, 2005 - June 30, 2006 report period, PA AHEC:

- Incorporated the Clean Air for Healthy Children program operated through the Pennsylvania Academy of Pediatrics into its educational programs for existing practices;
- Completed a training module for smokeless tobacco use;
- Initiated the planning of a curriculum to train physicians and practitioners serving disadvantaged populations in underserved communities;
- Initiated an electronic information program (Babies Breathe) for placement in healthcare facilities targeting pregnant mothers and parenting adults; and
- Completed a manual for use by medical schools providing the curriculum developed in the three medical schools for replication in medical schools across the Commonwealth.

In 2005, Pennsylvania healthcare professionals generated 34% of the referrals to the Pennsylvania Free Quitline.

COUNTERING THE TOBACCO INDUSTRY ADVERTISING CAMPAIGNS IN PENNSYLVANIA

During state fiscal year 2005-2006, the Department implemented the following counter marketing initiatives:

• Cessation: A comprehensive television campaign launched in 2004 was used in 2005-2006 to promote quitting smoking and the Pennsylvania's Free Quitline. The statewide cessation campaign was expanded through sports sponsorships with the Philadelphia Eagles and the Pittsburgh Steelers.

Nearly 42% of all callers to the PA Free Quitline heard about the program from television, radio or other types of advertisement.

• Retailer Education: The Department utilized existing media to implement re-airing of a statewide retailer campaign targeting tobacco retailers and clerks with the message that it is illegal to sell tobacco to minors, along with a direct mailing to retailers.

Pennsylvania's 2005 Synar Survey results reported an **8.1%** rate for illegal sales of tobacco products to minors compared to 27.9% in 2001.

PROVIDING TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE

Pennsylvania Alliance to Control Tobacco (PACT) provides a statewide information and education network for Primary Contractors and communities on tobacco prevention and control issues, with particular emphasis on a statewide grassroots campaign on tobacco smoke pollution.

According to a poll by Susquehanna Polling and Research conducted in December 2005, voters support passage of a statewide ban on smoking by a 73% - 23% margin and 81% consider exposure to tobacco smoke pollution (secondhand smoke) to be a health hazard.

PRIMARY CONTRACTORS

Selection Process: Through a competitive bid process, 48 Primary Contractors were identified to provide service to Pennsylvania's 67 counties.

Goals and Objectives: Primary Contractors standardized work statement is based on the nine components of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's Best Practices that include:

- Community programs to reduce tobacco use;
- Chronic disease programs to reduce the burden of tobacco-related diseases;
- School programs;
- Statewide programs to increase the capacity of local programs;
- Enforcement of applicable laws related to tobacco access;
- Counter marketing to counter pro-tobacco influences and increase pro-health messages;
- Cessation programs;
- Surveillance and evaluation system to monitor program; and
- Administration and management.

Primary Contractors are required to identify and engage the active and sustained support of community partners, including grassroots organizations and coalitions, State Health Improvement Plan (SHIP) community partnership; local chapters of the American Cancer Society, American Heart Association, and American Lung Association, public and professional Area Health Education Centers, hospitals and other institutional providers of medical care, county medical societies, school districts, universities and colleges, police departments, offices of President Judge, District Magistrates, and District Attorney, county cooperative extension offices, county human service agencies, the faith community, and drug and alcohol Single County Authorities within their service area to develop and implement a comprehensive tobacco control program.

REGIONAL (COMMUNITY HEALTH DISTRICT) SPECIAL INITIATIVES WITH PRIMARY CONTRACTORS

In response to the issuance of *Key Outcome Indicators for Evaluating Comprehensive Tobacco Control Programs* by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), Office on Smoking and Health, in May 2005, the Department launched a special intiative with the Primary Contractors. Identifying the right indicators to measure is key to a good evaluation which is essential to proving that tobacco prevention and control priograms are effective.

A technical assistance conference was held for Primary Contractors to provide evaluation training using the CDC Key Outcome Indicators handbook. Primary Contractors were then asked to meet at the regional level to develop a collaborative project and use the key outcome indicators that would be used to evaluate their project outcome. These projects were launched in the fourth quarter of SFY 2005-2006, and the evaluation of the projects will be completed and reported in SFY 2006-2007.

The Special Initatives that received funding were:

- Northeast Community Health District which includes the following Counties: Carbon, Lackawanna, Lehigh, Luzerne, Monroe, Northampton, Pike, Susquehanna, Wayne, Wyoming.
 - Project Description: Promotion of 1-800-QUIT-NOW through an outdoor media campaign (billboard) in each of the counties within the Northeast District.
- Northcentral Community Health District which includes the following Counties: Bradford, Centre, Clinton, Columbia, Lycoming, Montour, Northumberland, Potter, Snyder, Sullivan, Tioga, and Union.
 - Project Description: Rural spit tobacco initiative a two-part project to address and study the use of spit tobacco by school-aged children in rural Pennsylvania. Primary activities include framing of thinking, consequences of spit tobacco use, education, assessment, role modeling, and awareness of resources.
- Northwest Community Health District which includes the following Counties: Cameron, Clarion, Clearfield, Crawford, Elk, Erie, Forest, Jefferson, Lawrence, McKean, Mercer, Venango, and Warren
 - Project Description: TAP/TEG program. The Tobacco Education Group (TEG) is a positive alternative to suspension for youth using tobacco on school property or at school sponsored activities. Tobacco Awareness Program (TAP) is a comprehensive youth tobacco cessation curriculum addressing both smoking and spit tobacco.
- Southeast Community Health District which includes the following Counties: Berks, Bucks, Chester, Delaware, Lancaster, Montgomery, Philadelphia, and Schuylkill.

Project Description: Southeast PA Supports Smoker-Free Policies. Activities include conducting air quality surveys in the eight counties and the replication of a poster project conducted by New Jersey to show community support for a smoke-free Pennsylvania.

• Southcentral Community Health District which includes the following Counties: Adams, Bedford, Blair, Cumberland, Dauphin, Franklin, Fulton, Huntingdon, Juniata, Lancaster, Mifflin, Perry, and York.

Project Description: Promotion of 1-800-QUIT-NOW through an outdoor media campaign combined with a healthcare provider education initiative to increase referrals to the Quitline.

• Southwest Community Health District which includes the following counties: Allegheny, Armstrong, Beaver, Butler, Cambria, Fayette, Greene, Indiana, Somerset, Washington, and Westmoreland.

Project Description: Maternal smoking reduction and prevention initiative utilizing a media campaign to encourage pregnant women and mothers with limited income to call the Quitline. Activities will target day care centers, agencies serving mothers and families with limited incomes, key grocery stores, television public service announcements, and ongoing maternal smoking workgroups.

REPRESENTATIVE EXAMPLES OF THE ACHIEVEMENTS OF PRIMARY CONTRACTORS

Pittsburgh STOP Program Improves Birth Outcomes

STOP (Stop Tobacco in Pregnancy) is an evidence-based cessation program developed at Western Psychiatric Institute and Clinic (WPIC) at Magee Women's Hospital of UPMC.

STOP's mission is to enhance the health of pregnant women and babies through the delivery of an evidenced-based, individualized and motivational intervention for smoking cessation and relapse prevention. Participants are an ethnically diverse group of women who are generally poor, not well-educated, single and who have multiple and complex psychosocial concerns. STOP's referral sources include 43 community agencies and a network of healthcare practitioners throughout the county.

STOP - Birth Outcomes:

- Babies born to women who quit or stayed quit are born an average 227 grams heavier than babies of smokers.
- Gestational age is nearly one week longer for babies whose mothers quit or stayed quit compared to those who did not (38.2 weeks vs. 37.8 weeks).
- 22% of former smokers' babies were born preterm vs. 32% for smokers.

STOP - Quit Rates:

- The STOP program has been in place for four years; the quit rate (during pregnancy) is 34%.
- Of the 34% who quit smoking, 89% remained smoke free through delivery.

Tobacco Smoke Pollution: Grass Roots Advocacy Makes a Difference in Berks County

In the Berks County Borough of Fleetwood, the actions of a small group of 7th grade students formed the Fleetwood Area Youth Coalition that coordinated smoke-free activities in their community and promoted a smoke-free playground policy in the Borough of Fleetwood. The youth honored adult leaders who support smoke-free efforts at their annual Leadership Breakfast. This breakfast brought together state and local legislators, school administrators, prevention advocates and families around a common concern regarding the negative health impact of tobacco use.

Through community connections that began at the Leadership Breakfast, management at Giorgio Foods, a top twenty employer in Berks County, incorporated cessation services for both corporate employees and migrant workers. Cessation services included counseling, nicotine replacement options, and an evaluation by a nurse practitioner. In June, 2006, Giorgio Foods adopted a 100% smoke-free indoor air policy including the elimination of smoking in the indoor lunch area.

The Fleetwood Borough Council was also motivated by the efforts of the Fleetwood Youth Coalition. In June 2006, Fleetwood became the third municipality in Berks County prohibiting minors from public use and possession of tobacco products in the borough limits. Smoke-free areas were established at borough owned entrance areas, three smoke-free recreational areas, and at all community events in the park.

Success Stories from Clients of Project Salud in Chester County

My name is Miguel. I am 17 years old and I am from Mexico. I came to the United States in July of 2005. I started smoking when I was 15. Since I came to Chadds Ford, I heard from a friend that I met at the Mushroom Company about a program to stop smoking. I thought a lot about my uncle who died from a tumor caused by smoking two packs of ALAS Mexican brand a day. I am the only one in my family who smokes and I felt embarrassed. I love to play soccer and I noticed that every time I played I stopped running to catch my breath. One time I sat down to catch my breath and thought I am only seventeen years old and I am too young to feel this bad. In late April 2006, I signed up for the Not on Tobacco (NOT) program. Thanks to Project Salud and the people who support the program, I got medication at the clinic and finished the NOT program. I have been a nonsmoker for three months and feel healthier and stronger. I play sports now and don't smoke. I promise to be smoke free.

My name is Ruben. I am 36 years old and I am from Mexico. I began smoking at the age of 16 and I smoked a pack a day. My father and grandfather smoked a pack a day of the ALAS Mexican brand. My wife is a client at Project Salud and during one of her visits, the tobacco health educator asked her if anyone smoked in her family. He asked her to tell me to come into the clinic. My wife does not like the smell of smoke on me or the money I spend on cigarettes. She asked me to sign up for the Freedom from Smoking program with the tobacco health educator. I signed up for the program and I received medication from the Project Salud nurse practitioner. I have stopped smoking but I will continue with the medication. I feel healthier now and I know about the bad effects of smoking that I did not know before. I am very grateful for the program and the medication.

Carlisle SynTec Inc. Leads the Way in Cumberland County for Tobacco-Free Businesses

Carlisle SynTec, a leading manufacturer of single-ply roofing systems, has gone "over the top" to protect its employees from the ravages of tobacco. In January 2006, Carlisle SynTec enacted a policy making their administrative offices tobacco-free; the manufacturing operation is scheduled to follow suit in January 2007. The leadership team wanted to set a healthy example for its employees to follow, so the team led the way! The result of a health and wellness study surveying employees prompted the company to make the policy change. Carlisle SynTec involved their employees in this decision and offers several wellness resources to assist each employee to lead a healthier life.

Carlisle SynTec contracted with Sadler Health Center, funded through Tobacco Settlement monies by the Cumberland-Perry Drug and Alcohol Commission, to provide onsite cessation

classes for its employees. The offering of cessation classes and nicotine replacement therapy came nine months prior to the manufacturing site going tobacco-free, providing the employees with a window of opportunity to begin to consider quitting tobacco, get assistance with quitting, and be totally tobacco-free before the facility's policy takes effect next year.

Erie County School District Works to Make Smoking History

The Greater Erie Community Action Committee (GECAC), a service provider in Erie County, worked with Millcreek School District to change its tobacco use policy. Both saw policy change as an opportunity to provide students with education and tools to reduce or stop using tobacco.

The new policy now includes the option for first-time offenders to participate in the American Lung Association's (ALA) youth tobacco prevention and cessation program Alternative to Suspension (ATS) program in lieu of a school suspension and a fine. Because of the new policy, 60% of offenders (23 of 38 students) in the Millcreek School District participated in the ATS program.

The City of Chester Has "The Spirit" to Quit Smoking

For the first time in Delaware County, a unique smoking cessation program is engaging African-American smokers in the City of Chester. Love Thy Neighbor (LTN) is a faith-based smoking cessation outreach program that helps African-American smokers quit smoking for good. LTN asks local churches to focus on more than the spiritual and include tobacco-use among the concerns in their community. While other smoking cessation programs may not have been as successful in getting African-Americans to quit smoking, LTN has been in Chester.

As a result of offering a specific cessation program targeting the African-American community, Crozer-Keystone Health System has seen a 6.5% increase in participation by African-Americans in their cessation programs. A lower drop-out rate among the participants of the LTN Program was also noted as compared to other smoking cessation programs offered by Crozer-Keystone Health System.

Workplace Tobacco Cessation Efforts in Northcentral Pennsylvania

In 2005-2006, Clinical Outcomes Group, Inc., established key partnerships with over 40 employers in five counties (Columbia, Montour, Northumberland, Snyder, Union) in northcentral Pennsylvania. Within these partnerships, trained cessation staff offered on-site tobacco coaching services, nicotine replacement therapy, policy development, and implementation services. Overall 14 corporations developed tobacco-free policies and now provide all of their customers and employees with access to clean indoor air. Moreover, 848 persons were enrolled in one of several tobacco cessation programs (e.g., Quit and Win, individual coaching, etc.) of which 228 (26.9%) quit tobacco.

To help understand the financial benefit of tobacco cessation activities within the workplace, Clinical Outcomes Group, Inc., applied an industry standard average of \$2,000 in savings per employee per year to the total number of individuals who have quit tobacco through its workplace tobacco cessation initiatives (N=228). These savings are realized in terms of reduced sick time, lowered workman's compensation and disability payouts, lowered health insurance premiums, etc. On an annual basis, the tobacco cessation efforts provided by Clinical Outcomes Group Inc., saves local employers \$456,000 annually in costs. When extended over the lifetime of the average employee (15 years) the savings realized are \$6,840,000.

Smoke-Free Bingo in Warren County

The American Lung Association of Pennsylvania and the Warren County Tobacco Free Coalition recognized Starbrick Fire Department, Sheffield Fire Department, Pleasant Township Fire Department, Warren Senior Community Center, and Garland Fire Department with Certificates of Appreciation for providing Smoke-Free Bingo in Warren County. Each week hundreds of people play Bingo at these public places. In the past, the players were exposed to secondhand smoke. Although the Fire Departments and Senior Center had ventilation systems, it is a known fact that even the best system cannot eliminate the toxins in tobacco smoke. The organizers report they have not seen a drop in the number of attendees, and are seeing an increase in new faces.

York County's Community-wide Tobacco-Free Healthcare Campus Initiative

WellSpan Health joined Hanover, Memorial, and HEALTHSOUTH Rehabilitation Hospitals towards implementing a community-wide tobacco-free healthcare campus initiative. While tobacco-free healthcare campuses do exist across the country, this is the rare exception. There were numerous concerns related to such a policy that included the following issues: JCAHO hospital regulations, legal implications, reactions from patients, visitors, employees, neighbors, and the community at large to name a few. The administrations of the aforementioned organizations reached a formal decision to move forward January 2005.

Each of the organizations created task forces that further addressed the numerous issues related to implementing a successful initiative. Three committees focused on internal and external communication, support, and compliance issues. Ultimately, these cumulative findings of the task force assisted each of the organizations in arriving at a final go-no-go decision. In February 2006, Memorial, Hanover, HEALTHSOUTH, and WellSpan Health formally announced an affirmative decision to implement tobacco free healthcare campuses effective November 2006.

Hospitals are natural leaders in the tobacco-free movement because tobacco use is inherently at odds with their mission for healthcare improvement. By taking the lead, they are making clear their commitment to the health and well-being of their workers, patients, and visitors, as well as the communities they serve. This initiative represents one of the strongest statements a hospital can make about the health risks associated with tobacco use and the institution's concern for public health. This can serve as a model for others within and outside the community and ensure that more people are protected.

APPLICATIONS MADE AND GRANTS RECEIVED FOR TOBACCO PREVENTION AND CESSATION STATE FISCAL YEAR 2005-2006

The Department applied to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, Office on Smoking and Health, for the Federal Core Capacity Funding Cooperative Agreement to provide funding for eight Department staff, contract funding for development of a statewide strategic plan, program evaluation, awareness education, and outreach to support tobacco cessation initiatives and clean indoor air, and received an annual award in the amount of \$1,184,400.

The Department applied to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, Office on Smoking and Health, for supplemental funding to enhance the capacity of the Pennsylvania Free Quitline through initiatives targeting Pennsylvania's disparate populations, including ethnic and racial minority populations and the healthcare providers that serve these populations, and was awarded a one year grant in the amount of \$285,000.

The Department applied to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, Office on Smoking and Health, for supplemental funding to participate in a national initiative to assist states in the planning, development, and enhancement of each state's strategic plan to address tobacco related health disparities, and was awarded a one-year grant in the amount of \$68,549.

The American Legacy Foundation continues to provide opportunities for nonprofit organizations to prevent and reduce tobacco use among minority and underserved populations. The following Pennsylvania organizations received priority population grants:

- Nueva Esperanza Academy Charter High School in Philadelphia. Focus: Hispanic/Latino.
- Lehigh Valley Hospital, Coalition for a Smoke-Free Valley. Focus: Hispanic/Latino.
- National Association of African Americans for Positive Imagery (NAAAPI), Breathe Free. Focus: African American.
- Philadelphia Department of Public Health. Focus: Low Socioeconomic Status.
- Temple University, Smokefree Asian Youth (SAY). Focus: Asian-American/Pacific Islander.
- Family Health Council of Central Pennsylvania for the counties of Columbia and Montour. Focus: Conduct needs assessment, design a social support and cessation initiative.
